

CELEBRATING 25 YEARS 1984-2009

Founded in 1984 by a determined group of advocates, the Oakland Literacy Council has developed into a strong, independent organization.

Since 1984, the Council has worked with over 7,500 adult learners, and Council volunteers have provided more than 554,000 hours of volunteer service. Calculated at the modest sum of \$40 per hour the Council has contributed \$22,160,000 worth of service to Oakland County.

Several community awards reflect the quality of the Council's service and management. The Michigan Partnerships for Education Award recognized the Council for "Distinguished Efforts in Developing an Effective Partnership between Education and the Community." The Detroit Metropolitan Chapter of the American Society also named the Council "Outstanding Organization" for Public Administration.

1984 The Council began with one part-time employee.

1991 Evaluation Process Established: Personal Student Interviews and testing began.

1993 Guidelines were put in writing, establishing rules for tutors and students.

1993 We Expanded program to include English as a Second Language (ESL) students.

1996 The Council launched Reading Seeds© Family Literacy Program.

2001 New Volunteer Training was developed.

2003 The Council received ProLiteracy America Accreditation.

2004 We established The Literacy Partnership of Southeast Michigan a collaboration with Macomb & Detroit.

2007 We relocated to our new office in Bloomfield Hills.

2008 The Council became a stand-alone 501c(3) non-profit, not affiliated with a parent organization.

When Bob Gaylor heard a presentation on literacy at an American Library Association Conference in 1984, he thought, “We don’t have an illiteracy problem in Oakland County. It’s one of the wealthiest counties in the nation.” When he voiced his thoughts to staff at the Oakland County Library, they said, “Oh yes we do!”

It was this conversation that set Bob in motion and marked the beginning of the Oakland Literacy Council. Affectionately referred to as our “Founding Father,” Bob

is still knee-deep in Council activities after all these years.

An invaluable Board member for 25 years, Bob’s easy-going attitude and terrific sense of humor have made for some highly productive and very lively meetings. “One of the great things about Bob is that he never misses an opportunity to promote the Council. He cares about the organization so much that Bob has persuaded most of his friends, family, acquaintances and even complete strangers to contribute to the Council in one capacity or another,” laughs Council Director Carol Moraniec.

“The Council has given me the pleasure to know that I’m helping people. At least, when I leave here, I will know that I’ve done something good for someone else,” says Bob.

“Bob has never walked away, and he has always had goals,” says retired Council

Director Cathryn Hallisy. “He’s a visionary, always looking ahead, always formulating the next goal. He’s a great personality, easy to work with, enthusiastic. He’s a testament to the fact that in 1984 we walked in with \$5,000, and 25 years later The Council is still here.”

Bob last served as Associate Director of the Oakland University Library, retiring in 2004 after 37 years serving the University in a variety of capacities. He also worked part-time at the Oakland Schools Library. Bob has lived in the Rochester area exclusively, including 30 years at Meadowbrook Hall’s charming Gate House.

In his rare, brief moments of free time, Bob enjoys restaurant hopping, trivial pursuit, traveling, tooling around in his convertible, and spending time with his many friends, family and his beloved four legged friend, Ty.

Our First Director’s Career-Long Focus: Adult Learners

“I used to think I was stupid because I couldn’t read, but now I know I’m as smart as anyone.”

Feedback like this from one of Oakland Literacy Council’s successful adult learners kept Cathryn Weiss-Hallisy well motivated throughout her career as the Council’s first director. “The many positive comments from our learners convinced all of us involved in Oakland County literacy training—staff, volunteers, partners, and donors—that we were truly making a difference in peoples’ lives,” she said. “And that made all the difference in the world to us.”

Cathryn became the Council’s director in 1984, the same year the organization was formed. Among her qualifications for the job were an outstanding record of accomplishment in helping adults read and a lasting belief in her students’ infinite desire and capacity to learn. She had discovered these attributes as a teacher in Madison Heights’ Adult Basic Education prior to joining the Council.

“All I needed to know about teaching people to read came from my Adult Education experience,” recalled Cathryn. “The many other skills we needed to run a successful organization, we learned on the job. Yet everything we did was with one objective in mind: improving our programs and services for our adult reading learners.”

Cathryn, known for her “scathingly brilliant ideas,” was always willing to look at things from every angle. “She was a pleasure to work with and I couldn’t have asked for a better mentor and friend,” says current Council Director Carol Moraniec.

Cathryn, her staff and tutors took great pride in the achievements of their reading graduates. Her favorite memories include one of a woman who was a Council “Student of the Year.” She enrolled in Oakland Community College’s culinary arts program and, after graduation, became a chef in a prominent Detroit restaurant. Another was of a learner who became a tutor—and then

helped an entire Vietnamese family learn how to read. To honor Cathryn for her 24 years
