on the task force is tutor Bonnie
Manza, a former instructor at
OCC and the wife of OLC board

Wrapping up the roster is board
member John Almstadt, who is
contributing his skills and
valuable experience as a former
Director at Oakland County
Michigan Works. We hope to

begin student sessions in the fall and later offer tutor training workshops and an online ecourse. The workshops likely also will be open to non-students, with referrals coming from Michigan Works! and other local agencies.




