#### **PATRICK FLORES-SCOTT**

**Patrick Flores-Scott** grew up in bilingual home in the Seattle area. For years — all the way through college, in fact — Patrick hid the fact that he didn't really read. He could read but it was so hard to concentrate that he struggled to get through a book.

As a longtime public school teacher, he was inspired to "write something that would've kept me engaged back when I was really struggling. I'd write about characters with big hearts who were searching to find their place in the world."

Patrick's first novel, *Jumped In*, was named to the 2014 YALSA Best Fiction for Young Adults list and was a Walden Award finalist and Washington Book Award winner.

His second novel, *American Road Trip*, is a 2019 Best Fiction for Young Adults pick and was nominated for multiple state lists and awards. **While a YA book, it addresses mature** themes as a teenager and his siblings face educational, financial, and mental health challenges, including PTSD.

Patrick, wife Emma, and their two children live in Ann Arbor. He enjoys speaking at local schools about his experiences. "...Flores-Scott isn't afraid to dive into the deep end, then come up for a blissful gulp of air."
