How to Find the Career Module

1. Log in to **Burlington English Online**
2. Go to **Courses**
3. Click on **Careers**
4. Navigate to **Career Exploration & Soft Skills** OR **Workforce Preparation**
5. Select your learner's level: **Beginner, Intermediate, or Advanced**
6. Click on **In-Class Lessons**
7. Choose a lesson that aligns with your learner's interests or goals

How Tutors Can Use the Career Modules

- Preview a lesson together and discuss the job or workplace scenario
- Select one short activity (video, vocabulary, or reading)
- Pause to ask reflection or comprehension questions
- Connect the lesson to the learner's experiences or goals

Works Well For

- ESL learners: job vocabulary, listening, speaking practice
- Reading learners: comprehension, workplace vocabulary

- Math learners: schedules, pay, time, problem-solving discussions

How to Find English for Specific Careers

How Tutors Can Use English for Specific Careers

- Introduce job-specific vocabulary using built-in career wordlists
- Practice pronunciation and meaning together
- Use words in sentences related to the learner's real work or goals
- Identify terms commonly found in job postings or training programs

Works Well For

- ESL learners: workplace language and job-specific vocabulary
- Reading learners: comprehension and career-related vocabulary
- Math learners: vocabulary connected to schedules, pay, measurements, and procedures
